The Foundation

The Percy Hedley Foundation was founded in 1953 by parents as a specialist school for children with cerebral palsy.

Although our commitment and passion to helping people develop their abilities, live the life they want and be happy, has not changed; We have grown and the expectations of our members, their families and our employees have progressed significantly.

When the first school opened there were only 12 students, but we now support over 650 members and their families each week through residential care, education, and lifelong learning opportunities.

So, who is Percy Hedley? Well, he passed away before the Foundation was formed and was never personally involved in any way with a project that would bear his name. Before his passing in 1941, Percy Hedley decided to create a trust – the Percy Hedley Will Trust – to leave all his money to be used for charitable purposes in the North East.

After a chance meeting between the parents who founded the school and Percy Hedley's solicitor, we became one of three charities to benefit from the trust.

Percy Hedley never knew how his accumulated wealth would benefit so many or that his name would become so well-known in the region!

We are one of the leading providers of schools for children with Special Educational Needs in Newcastle upon Tyne. We have 2 schools, based in Forest Hall and Jesmond that offer specialist provision education for a range of complex physical disabilities and learning difficulties, and cater for children and teenagers aged 3 to 19 years old.



We believe that our core purpose is to engage, enable and empower every pupil to optimise their future life chances by unlocking individual potential and maximising their progress and attainment.

Visual Impairment and Blind



Hedleys College is a high quality specialist further education and training provider for young people aged 16-25 with a range of learning difficulties and disabilities who require specialist individual programmes to develop their communication, independence and employability skills to make a successful transition into adulthood within the North East region. The College site is based at Forest Hall in Newcastle and offers a range of programmes and flexible packages of further education and training across Tyne and Wear. The College is part of the wider Percy Hedley Foundation which offers a range of support for students who attend our provision. This includes access to high quality integrated therapy, social enterprises, the Hedley Employability Project and the Hedleys Sport and leisure facilities.







Hedley's Horizon's is an adult day service for people with additional needs, based within the groups of Hedley's College.

At Hedleys Horizons you can continue to work on employability, independence, communication and choice making skills and to take part in a range of social enterprises. These social enterprises, Multimedia, Music, Print and Horticulture, along with other activities provide meaningful lifelong learning goals, promote mental wellbeing and offer purposeful activities and enterprise. You can also choose to access volunteering opportunities in your local community with support.

Hedley's Horizons also includes individualised programmes of activities for those of you who need a higher level of support to meet physical needs, health care needs or communication needs.







Residential

Here at Percy Hedley, we have four specialist residential care homes throughout Newcastle upon Tyne in Jesmond, Killingworth, and Forest Hall, and have been specialists in the field since the 1960's when our first residential building, Chipchase House, was opened.

Over the years we've expanded to open Leybourne House, Wansbeck House and Tyne House – who offer care for different age groups, medical conditions, and disabilities through the highest standard of person-centred care within a safe, homely environment.



Our oldest and largest residential site, in Forest Hall, which is home to around 50 residents, some of whom, have been with us since we opened. With large, impressive gardens and greenhouses, and ample access to local amenities







Correct terms and wording when referring to the Foundation and it's members.

Pupils or Students

Children and Young People attending our schools.

Young People

Teenagers and students attending our college or post 16 education.

People that are living within our residential care homes.

Adults that access or attend our adult services, a term that members chose for themselves.

Disabled People or Disabled Children

The preferred term that disabled people use rather than "people with disabilities".

Wheelchair User

We use this term rather than "wheelchair bound" which implies negativitiy around using a wheelchair.





Terminology


Positive not negative. Avoid phrases like 'suffers from' which suggest discomfort, constant pain and a sense of hopelessness.

Referring to disabled people as 'vulnerable' implies inherent weakness and helplessness. It can also result in making people more of a target for domestic violence, disability related harassment and hate crime. Disabled people can find themselves in vulnerable situations, often due to lack of support and social isolation and it is this that should be tackled.
